

A Message to Dixie Springs Residents







Important information about changes to the powerlines for the Lake Powell Pipeline

The Lake Powell Pipeline (LPP) team along with Dixie Power and the Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) scheduled a meeting to share information with residents about proposed changes to the location of the powerlines for the LPP at a public information open house in April. Due to the public gathering restrictions in place for COVID-19, we have opted to send you the information instead.

The LPP team, including the Utah Division of Water Resources and Washington County Water Conservancy District, has proposed that the power transmission lines for the project be rerouted to the south and west of Sand Hollow Reservoir, as shown on the following map. This rerouted line (shown in orange) minimizes impacts within the Dixie Springs neighborhood and will be a minor modification to the project.



This proposal was made possible because of the following reasons:

- Dixie Power constructing a new substation within the next two to five years, just west of Sand Hollow Reservoir near the corner of West 3150 South Street and South 4900 West Street. This new substation will serve existing and developing neighborhoods on the west side of the reservoir as a Dixie Power project that is independent of the LPP. However, the substation will provide the needed connection to the grid within the proposed construction timeline of the LPP project.
- LPP Project Team responding to feedback from Dixie Springs residents received during Reclamation's public comment process and facilitating this proposal with Dixie Power to minimize impact.
- Reclamation studying this option as part of the project's environmental review. If a Record of Decision is signed on this proposal, the transmission lines will be rerouted as shown on the map in orange.

Reclamation's environmental review includes the preparation of a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS). The DEIS will be available for public review and comment this summer. We encourage you to submit comments regarding this proposed change to the power transmission lines and any other thoughts you may have about the LPP at that time.

The LPP is a state of Utah water project that will serve residents in Washington and Kane counties. The project will transport water from Lake Powell through an approximately 140-mile buried pipeline to Sand Hollow Reservoir. From the reservoir, the water will be delivered to Washington County residents, including those living in Dixie Springs, by the Washington County Water Conservancy District (WCWCD).
